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### **First Ohio Woman Voter**

*The Journal-Tribune*, Marysville, Ohio  
Thursday, November 4, 1971, page 2 column 3

The first woman to vote in the state of Ohio was a former Union County woman.

Fifty-one years ago **Mrs. John C. Bump** (See editor’s notes below.), 82, now of Bellefontaine, cast a sealed ballot in Marysville for **Warren G. Harding** for president and became the first woman to vote in the state.

Mrs. Bump recalls she and her husband were in the final stages of moving from their property, near Marysville when election time rolled around.

She says just before they left on Oct. 26, 1920, Republican party workers picked she and her husband up in an auto, drove them into town to the court house to vote.

The couple has been married for 65 years and live with a son, **Carroll** in Bellefontaine.

[**Editor’s note:** John C. Bump married **Mollie Simmons** on 2 February 1907. The couple is buried at Raymond Cemetery.]

gy and DNA go hand in hand. Why use DNA testing? It helps with the brick walls and picks up where a paper trail ends. You can focus your research on related families. It is your connection to your ancestors. Debra highly recommended the PBS videos Journey of Man and First Peoples that have been on television. Check your local library for copies or check online.

She explained the different types of DNA testing and the type of results you get. Recommended DNA testing companies are:

- 23andMe.com
- FamilyTreeDNA.com
- AncestryDNA.com
- Geno2.com

The more money you invest in your DNA, the more results you will get. You can also input your results in Promethease.com for a health report. She ended with a demo using her Ancestry account and showed what the DNA results come up with. Expect the Unexpected with your search.

Next month's meeting will be Stephen Badenhop, Records Center & Archives Coordinator. He will give us a tour of the updated website and what records can be researched online. That meeting will be November 21 at 10 am.

Thursday, July 13, 1876

—**Asbury Johnson** and **Joseph Rees** were sentenced to the penitentiary last Friday at Urbana for three and two years respectively.

—A daughter of **Robert McMillen**, some sixteen years of age, living three and a half miles South-West of town, was struck by lightning on Friday last while standing in the yard. She was rendered senseless by the shock, but afterwards recovered, the shock not being severe enough to prove fatal.

—Cadet **Henry Heistand**, of West Point, arrived at his home, in this place, on Friday last, on a short leave of absence, to visit friends and relatives, looking quite well, as though the "soldier life" agreed with him perfectly.

# Union County Delinquent Chattel Tax for 1848

On February 6, 1849, **Cyprian Lee**, Treasurer of Union County, Ohio, certified to **John Johnson**, Auditor of Union County; the list of tax payers who failed to pay the tax on their personal property for 1848. Lee also noted the reason the tax was not paid. Some had died between the time the tax was assessed and the time the taxes were due. One became insane. Most had moved from the county and are listed as “left,” “removed,” “out of county” or “sloped.” (**Note:** *sloped* means to disappear quickly). The rest were either not found, or had no property. The names appearing on the Delinquent Chattel Tax for 1848 are listed below by township and are cross referenced with the regular Chattel Tax list:

**Editor’s note:** Taylor Township does not appear in the following list as it was not formed until December 5, 1849 by granting a petition from **R. L Judy**. This final township encompassed lands taken from York, Liberty, and Leesburg Townships.

## *African American: Vaughan/Vaughn Obituaries*

**Editor's note:** In the September-October issue of the *Union Echoes* I published a Family Group Sheet for the Vaughan family. The following obituaries provided some of the information for the "bare bones" information. The obituaries help show us their stories. Son, **Henry**, died in Knox County and is buried in Marion Cemetery, Marion County, Ohio.

**Winifred Vaughn**, Infant daughter of J. A. Vaughn and Rose Vaughn, aged eleven months and 15 days.

At the home of his father, on the 13th inst., **James A. Vaughn**, aged 23 years. He died of consumption. He was numbered among the very best of the worthy young men of Marysville.

James A. Vaughan, the well known colored plasterer who has been a resident of Marysville for about twenty-seven years, died at his residence, north of town, Friday evening in the fifty-fourth year of his age. He had for some time been going down with that fatal disease, consumption, and for the last year it became obvious that his days were numbered in the near future. For the last six months or more he had been unable to attend to business, and he quietly awaited the summons which is the certain fate of all living. He was a man well respected wherever known, and always bore an honorable reputation in all his business transactions.

Mr. Vaughan was born in Murfreesborough, North Carolina, in 1831. He leaves a wife and five children to mourn his loss. His funeral was held Sabbath afternoon and was largely attended by the

citizens of this place. An appropriate sermon was preached by Rev. **Calihan**, the pastor of the A. M. E. church, after which the remains were conveyed to Oakdale and placed in the vault.

**Death of Josie Vaughn.**

This young lady, well known to most of our city people, died at the home of her mother, Friday morning, August 5th. She was a lady of marked talents, having passed through our schools and graduated, in our High school at the head of her class in 1880, for which honor she was awarded a scholarship in the O. W. University at Delaware [Ohio Wesleyan University].

She purposed after graduating to become a teacher, and soon after accepted a call to the Circleville colored schools to teach the higher branches, which position she filled creditably and to the acceptance of her employers, till she was compelled a month or two ago to resign her post on account of failing health.

Returning to her home, she received all the aid that medical skill could devise and kind friends could render; but her disease gained rapidly, and Friday morning she closed her earth-life at the age of 29 years, 4 months and 22 days.

No one in our community had more exalted views of the proprieties of life or was held in higher esteem by our people that Josie Vaughn. Her purity of life, her affability of manners, and her industry and perseverance amid difficulties, are traits in the line of success which all young people should study to imitate. These excellent points of character gave her tender respect wherever she was known. Her death is greatly deplored by the citizens of this place where she was so well known, as also by those in the city where her brief life was spent as a teacher.

The funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the family residence. Remarks were made by Rev. **J. W. Lewis**, pastor of the A. M. E. church of this place, Rev. **G. W. Maxwell**, of Delaware, under whose ministrations at Circleville she united with the church, and Prof. **Cole**, her former teacher. She became an active worker in the church, and adorned her profession in her Savior by an humble and consistent Christian life. Her faith in Christ was her rejoicing in life and her comfort in death.

The services being over, the remains were conveyed by hearse to Oakdale and deposited in the vault, and will this week be interred in the family lot.

She went to her school charge about the tenth of September, but was compelled to return home about two weeks ago, so poorly that there appeared to be no hope of recovery. She sank rapidly till Tuesday noon, when death closed her brief earth life. This is the fourth member of the family that has died within a period of about three years, and the homestead has been literally a house of continued mourning. Mrs. **Vaughn** has the sympathy of this community in her sad bereavement.

The funeral services will take place at the A. M. E. church, at 2 o'clock p. m. Thursday.

A . . . death was reported from Chicago Thursday, which was also a sadness to citizens of this place. It was that of **Mrs. Nettie Martin**, nee **Vaughn**, (colored) well known to most of our people. She died of consumption and was the last of five bright daughters, all of whom had preceeded [sic.] her with the same fatal disease. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Vaughn, who were for many years highly respected citizens of this place, and was born August 10, 1866. For the past five or six years she had been a resident of Chicago where she was married in January 1892 to **Mr. Eugene Martin** of that city. As a result of this union one child was born, which is now three months old. Mrs. Martin completed the course in the Marysville schools and graduated with honor

from the high school in 1885. As a student and young lady she always ranked with the foremost and her friends were numbered among all classes. Of eight children there are but two living—**Henry Vaughn**, of this city, and Benjamin, whose home is in Chicago.

The remains were brought to this city on Friday and the funeral services were held the same afternoon at four o'clock in the A. M. E. church, being conducted by **Rev. Wm. G. March**. The interment was made in the family Lot at Oak Dale [Sic.] Cemetery.

For a number of years he ran a chair car on the Burlington Railroad but later resigned his position for another with the stock yards at Chicago. It is not known whether he had returned to railroad-ing or not. He was 32 years of age and leaves a wife.

**Note:** Ben's name was **John Bennette Vaughan**. But he was also known as **J. Benjamin Vaughn**, as well as Benjamin.
