A Message from the President:



While the Civil War (War Between the States, or War of Northern Aggression) ended a hundred and fifty-one years ago, the war had left thousands of veterans with little or nothing gained and much lost. They were unable to talk to their families about the atrocities they had witnessed and the comrades in arms that they had lost. Speaking of those things made them all too real for the veteran and far too graphic for “polite company.” Many had come home to farms in ruins due either to battles fought there, or wives and children overwhelmed by plowing, planting and harvesting and unable to do the job. Many found their businesses in bankruptcy caused by poor management. Many of the veterans had lost limbs and had other war related health problems.

Sadly, the government was less prepared for peace than it had been for war. In no time at all corrupt and incompetent politicians in both the North and South made matters worse. Therefore, the veterans took things into their own hands. One hundred fifty years ago, in 1866, the Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.) was founded by Union veterans in Decatur, Illinois; and was open to veterans of all military branches.

“He Did What?”

Researching Criminal Records Presented by Leona Gustafson



I have been doing genealogical research since summer 1975. I have done research for my own family and for others. I am a past member of the National Genealogical Society, the New England Historic Genealogical Society; The Ohio Historical Society (now the Ohio History Connection), and several state genealogical societies. Presently I am a member of the Nebraska Genealogical Society with Pioneer Family status; Ohio Genealogical Society, the Union County Chapter of the OGS and the Union County Historical Society. When I find (or make) time I also do indexing for FamilySearch, and I have helped index obituaries for the Rutherford B. Hayes Presidential Center Obituary Index.

You never know when you might find that the reason Uncle Fred was so hard to pin down and difficult to locate in records is because he was being detained in a state penal institution. I will attempt to introduce you to some research tools at local, county, and state levels. I will illustrate some of the earliest means of identifying a criminal. I will also follow at least one person from the crime to the ultimate conclusion.

The Union County Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society held their meeting on Saturday, August 20 at 10:00 a.m. at the Marysville Public Library in Meeting Room A. President, Leona Gustafson, welcomed members and guests present.

Dave Gustafson, corresponding secretary and membership chair, reported that we have received 2 membership renewals and 2 new members since the June meeting and sold 3 books and 3 CD's. Marie Bouic reported that the Bouic Index is available to members online on the website: uccogs.org. Leona asked the group for articles, queries for the newsletter.

Leona announced the meetings for the rest of the year:

- Sep. 17: **Steve Barker** — "Using Maps for Genealogy Research".
- Oct. 15: **Leona Gustafson** — "He Did What? Researching Criminal Records."
- Nov. 19: **Susan Hunter** will talk about the newly Indexed records of the Freedmen's Bureau (African American), and new members, **Clyde & Janet Morrow** will present, "Assisting One and Another Through Indexing."

Leona then introduced the speaker for the morning, Lynn Baldwin, a member of the group who serves on the Lineage Committee and secretary to the Plain City Historical Society. Lynn graduated from Jonathan Alder High School and Bowling Green University. She taught school for 36 years before retiring in 2010. Lynn's topic was "Applying to a Lineage Society." Lynn walked the group through on filling out an application and what information is needed. She had a PowerPoint presentation which was very detailed and helpful to everyone.

Lineage Societies are organizations that are created to honor a specific heritage or event. Union County's lineage groups are Pioneers with two levels: Gold for ancestors who lived in the county through January 1, 1841; and Silver for ancestors who lived in the county from January 1, 1841 – December 31, 1850. Military examples are D.A.R. and S.A.R. Our society also promotes Civil War Ance-

tors. Common trait lineage societies examples are Society of Mayflower Descendants; Order of Descendants of Pirates and Privateers; Descendants of the Illegitimate Sons and Daughters of the Kings of Britain and many others. Why should you join a lineage society? Becoming a member is one way to honor and recognize your ancestor's accomplishments and contributions to history. Membership also preserves your well documented research for future generations to take advantage of. Usually such memberships provide "members only" privileges.

Evidence is documents you submit. You need sufficient evidence to prove you a direct descendant of a pioneer ancestor you are proving. There are two types, primary and secondary evidence. Primary sources are original sources created at the time of the event such as courthouse or other government records, church or school records. Secondary sources are Bible records, diaries or letters, census records, newspaper clippings, obituaries and county histories. Each item on the applications should have a primary source or 2 secondary sources. Unacceptable sources are undocumented family histories, oral, written or published family histories, lineage papers from other societies, family group sheets and charts, family reunion records.

Evidence that is needed for the application include birth, death, marriage, Bible or baptismal records, wills and land deeds if they mention a relationship. Lynn suggested printing out the rules for the society if you are applying to and make a work copy of the application. Be sure and to use maiden names for the females on your application. You need to show a direct relationship and Union County residency on your application. Use a red pen and underline the significant parts of the document that support your ancestor. Do not submit original documents. Include an ancestor chart. Be sure and number your documents to match the sources.

For Civil War Families of Union County, Ohio (CWFUCO) you can submit through a direct ancestor or apply through a collateral ancestor (brother or sister of the person who served in the war). Applications to the Union County societies are accepted any time and after they have been reviewed and approved, their certificate and pin will be awarded at the next scheduled meeting or mailed to the new

CWFUCO member. They will also be listed in the next *Union Echoes* newsletter.

Dave Gustafson, membership chair and corresponding secretary, reported that we have received four new members since the last meeting.

Leona announced that there were newsletters from Defiance County for 1986-1996 and 1997-2007 and Columbia County 1990 – 1998 were available to anyone who wanted them along with other monthly county newsletters. We have received new books, one which is already on the shelf, *The Tevis Family* by Mary M. Bell; there are Tevis ties to Union and Logan Counties. Another recent donation is *Michael Wallace Rogers and Mary "Polly" Cole and Their Descendants – Licking & Union Counties*, created by Glenn David Rogers, Colonel, USASF, Retired, August 2016.

Leona will be presenting the program, "He Did What?--Researching Criminal Records," next month, October 15. November 19 will be Susan Hunter telling about the newly indexed records of the Freedmen's Bureau (African American) and new members, Clyde & Janet Morrow will present, "Assisting One Another Through Indexing."

October is Family History Month and the library is to have 3 special programs to celebrate the event with the first one on October 6 at 6:30 pm – "Getting to Know FamilySearch.org, presented by Robert Bremer. On October 14 at 4:00 pm, Sue Kienbaum will present "Shake Your Family Tree." On October 20 at 6:30 pm, Patty O'Connor will present "Getting to Know Ancestry (Library Edition) and Heritage Quest."

Marie Bouic then introduced the speaker for the morning, Steve Barker who presented a PowerPoint program on the SmartBoard, "Using Historical Maps for Family Research." Steve is a Millcreek Twp. resident and a graduate of The Ohio State University

with degrees in Archaeology and History. In his free time he enjoys metal detecting, bow hunting and doing historical research.

Steve's topic focused on using historical maps in Union and Delaware Counties. The "1877 Union County Atlas" is the earliest map showing the names of landowners along with acreage and additional details. At the engineer's office, he found 1880, 1890, 1900, 1908 and 1910 County Engineers plat maps. Delaware County has available an 1849 map of Delaware, Marion and Morrow Counties along with 1866 and 1875 atlases. Also available are various plat maps starting from 1880 until the present at the Engineer's Office.

The 1877 Union County Atlas lists on the map, landowner's names, acreage owned, schools, churches, grange halls, kilns, mills, pools and springs. Also included, on separate pages, are pictures of affluent homes of landowners. The Delaware County 1875 Atlas also lists the same items.

Steve listed a few websites that have been helpful in his research:

- www.historicmapworks.com—Historic Map Works Residential Genealogy . At the site you can type in Union County, Ohio (or any location). There is a spot where you can click on Google maps and you toggle between the historic map and present day.
- LiB.utexas.edu/maps/Top/Ohio--The University of Texas Libraries, Perry-Castañeda Library Map Collection, Historical Maps of the United States. The first map for Union County is from 1916 and another done in 1944. Delaware County has 1901 with another done in 1942.
- Steve showed a book, *Family Maps of Wyandot County*, compiled by Greg Boyd, J.D., who used the Bureau of Land Management (www.glorecords.blm.gov/default.aspx) to research the original owners of land from the very beginning and compiled them into books of counties by state. Mr. Boyd's website is www.ARPHAX.com.

Steve also mentioned that anyone fortunate enough to find family property maps should try to

have them preserved, too. He then gave a demonstration on the SmartBoard on using the Historic Maps site.

Union County in the Rainbow (Forty-Second) Division Company E 166th (4th Ohio) Infantry
