# NINTY-FIRST BIRTHDAY Of Uncle Robert McMillen West of Town Celebrated on the Fourth of July.

Uncle **Robert McMillen**, west of town, who was ninety-one years of age on the Fourth of July, was made happy Sunday by a number of his descendants gathering at the house of his son, **John M. McMillen**, where the venerable old gentleman has made his home for some time, and appropriately celebrated the passing of the ninety-first milestone of his life.

Mr. McMillen was feeling exceedingly good for one of that age and enjoyed the day's visit and also the dinner with his children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren. A big dinner was served at noon which was heartily enjoyed by all and the many pleasantries of the day will long remain in the memory of all present.

Mr. McMillen is a pioneer of the neighborhood in which he lives, having located there about sixty years ago when the dense forest was full of game. He was born in Jefferson county, Ohio, situated in the eastern part of the state and came to this county while a vigorous young man and helped to improve and make this country what she is today—the garden spot of Ohio, populated by the best people in the United States in the best government in the world.

## 1832-1876 Richwood in the Past

A Historical sketch of the past and present, and read, by A.J. Blake, Esq., at the centennial fourth of July celebration, at Richwood.

The history of Richwood, as well as Claibourne Township, cannot well be traced back, with any degree of certainty of definiteness, any later than the year 1832. From that time until the present the chain is pretty well unbroken. As I am assigned to work on the history of Richwood, I find that I am necessarily forced to link a portion of it to that of Claibourne Township. I would dwell more on the Township, had I not been confined to the town. Hence our county cousins will not feel slighted if I do not give extended notice of their early doings and virtues.

I find, upon investigation, that we once resided in Jackson Township, or Jackson Township was here. This was in 1832; back of this I shall not attempt to go.

I have procured a copy of the original survey of Richwood, which gives in the language of its original proprietor, **Philip Plummer**, the metes, bounds, streets, alleys, dedicated lots, and all of the details of this village, which, in the past ten years has been our pride, and the envy of surrounding villages:

[At this point the article contains the exact wording of the Richwood Town Plat, and has been omitted by Mr. Longberry.]

Some little time previous to this, **Phillip Plummer** purchased what was known as the Pelham Survey, and had laid it off into lots of land of 100 acres each.

In 1832, himself, Dr. John P. Bookins, and Absolom Carney, erected cabins and occupied them. Within the bounds of what is now Claibourne Township, there were at this time adult males all having families, as follows: Henry Schwartz, Edward Williams, John Clark, Jas. Clark, Henry Clark, George Clark, Nathaniel Wilson, Joseph Wilson, Adam Imbody, Eleazer Rose, Thomas Andrews, Adam Dilsaver, Wm Tonguet, Larkin Tonguet, Robert Cottrell, Robert McIntyre, Jacob Bennett, William Bennett, John Beem, and Zerah Linsley.

In 1833, there came into the Township, Wm. Jackson, John Dilsaver, Bazaleel Bridge, John Shisler, Benjamin Beem, Jacob Beem, Richard Irwin, and Aaron Beem, so much for township settlers.

Originally, a congregation made up mostly of German immigrants, the surnames of the charter members are:

RAUSCH, BLUMENSCHEIN, ELL, EMMERT, DASCHER, GOESZ, HEER, HEGENDERFER, KREITLER, RIPPER, RUPPRECHT, and three Americans, BROWN, SEEGER, and BARTHOLOMEW

The first church building was dedicated in 1838 and burned in 1843. Therefore, the records of baptisms, marriages, and burials only date back to 1843 and the records of confirmation begin in 1844.

# July Meeting With 4-H Kids

At the July 18<sup>th</sup> meeting members and guests were treated to a very special group of young people. They are members of various Union County 4-H clubs.

Michelle Darnell, a member of the Liberty Acres 4-H Club, and working on her third year the Family History Treasurer Hunt Project. She did more research on her Darnell surname and shared a picture of her third great grandmother, Martha Carter Newlove.

Jessica Alley is a member of the Liberty Acres 4-H Club and is also doing her third year in the Family History Treasure Hunt Project. Jessica had been doing more research on her Welsh great-great-grandfather, Joseph Morgan and his son, Charles L. Morgan. She

has written a page on both grandfathers and shared items she had purchased at a Welsh festival in Washington D.C. She has added more documents and sources to her notebook in the past year.

Another third year Family History Treasure Hunt Project member, **Brock Johe**, of the Plain City Country Kids 4-H Club shared family history books on his **Moorehead** and the **Johe** Lineage. His Johe ancestors are from Germany; they sailed to America in the mideighteenth century. They originally settled in Pennsylvania. Brock has military records and pictures in his collection.

**Steven Roush**, a first year genealogy project and member of the Plain City Country Kids 4-H Club shared his five generation chart with pictures of all his grandparents. Surnames he is working on are **Roush**, **Rausch**, **Nicol**, **Weinlein**, **Lucas**, and **Leach**. He is collecting sources and documents for his records.

Colleen Andrews, a second year member of the genealogy project and member of the Town and Country 4-H Club shared her family tree poster and photo tree. She also shared her notebook and family history books. The surnames she is researching are Andrews, Roney, and Zahn that have lived in Union County. Her most exciting find so far is the will of Archibald Andrews who died in Watkins in 1907 and was a Civil War veteran.

# Judah Dodge I, Judah Dodge II and John Kilgore Dodge

The ancestors of our Dodge Union County pioneers were descended from <u>Tristram Dodge</u>, who came from the north of England to Taunton, Massachusetts, removing to Block Island, Rhode Island in 1661. In 1812, a descendant, <u>Judah Dodge</u> and his family, including his son <u>Judah</u>, <u>II</u>, then 17, moved to Ohio in a covered wagon. Oral history tells that Judah was a big strong man who was able to lift a wagon blocking their path so that they could continue on their trip.

Another story tells of this same ancestor driving home with a sled of freshly butchered pork when he was attacked by wolves. Judah let the horses run, staying on the back of the sled to beat the wolves off with a sled stake. One of the wolves was brave enough to get close to Judah on the sled, but was clubbed to death by our ancestor, and reportedly that wolf hide was on the floor of their cabin for many years.

Judah I was married to <u>Annis Chapman</u>. There is speculation that there is a family connection to Johnny Appleseed (<u>John Chapman</u>), and <u>Otto J. Dodge, who was Emma's uncle,</u> said that he was told Johnny Appleseed was a frequent visitor to the homestead.

Judah I arrived in Union County in 1812, settling on the <u>Crocker Smith</u> farm in Darby Township. He later moved to Jerome, and in 1836 purchased 400 acres of dense forest near New California. He died there in 1856, and he and his wife are buried in New California.

Judah II cleared land with his father, and later married <u>Elizabeth Kilgore</u> on July 4th 1816. They moved to Marysville in 1867, and Judah died there three years later. I believe he is buried in the cemetery at New California.

John Kilgore Dodge was reared in Jerome Township, and married Rebecca Rudolph Sept. 29, 1855, in Delaware County, and in 1857 they moved to Mill Creek Township. Rebecca, according to oral history, was part Native American, although there is no official proof of this. I have a photograph of her that would lend credence to the belief, but in those days Native American blood was a thing to keep quiet, not to record. There is a tale, told by the Dodge sons, that a man wrapped in a blanket used to wander in to visit from time to time, and when they asked who he was, they were told he was a cousin. Many relics of Indian life were found on that farm.


To this day, there family members who carry the Dodge name as a middle name, and I do believe there are some in Union County and elsewhere who have that surname. It's one to take pride in.


