President's Message - by John Gray

From time to time I like to recommend a new book that has both historical and genealogical interest. As one of the founders of the National Blue Family Association we have been learning that the Blue's who settled in Union County, and many other places in Ohio early on in our history, are of Dutch ancestry. We have traced our line back to Manhattan and Long Island in the mid 1600's. Our ancestor's baptisms are recorded in the Dutch Reform Church there.

If you have Dutch ancestry, you will enjoy reading Russell Shorto's new book about Manhattan and New Amsterdam that *is* just excellent reading. The book is entitled "***The Island at the Center of the World***", the Epic Story of Dutch Manhattan and the Forgotten Colony that Shaped America", by Doubleday, cost is \$27.50.

This book is probably the first of several to come out on this subject, as over 12,000 documents and letters from that time period have recently been found and are presently being translated. It is a tedious task and only a few people in the world are able to translate these papers in any sort of coherent fashion while relating them to known historical events already recorded in our history books.

This *is* also a fine biographical effort on Peter Stuyvesant, the strict but also very capable director of New Amsterdam. The book describes his relationship with the people of New England and those to whom he reported back in Holland. The book puts into perspective how the balance of power fell from Dutch run New Amsterdam to the relatively non-violent takeover by the English, who renamed the place New York, after the Duke of York. A lot of New England boundaries were set during Stuyvesant's time in authority as various European nations vied for control of the New World.

If you have run across a good book on Union County pioneers, let us know and we will publish your book review in the Echoes.

Gale Martin-Hansgen as "Mary Jemison"

The speaker at the February U.C.G.S meeting was Gale Martin-Hansgen, director of the Marion County Historical Society. She presented a program on Mary Jemison, a white woman who lived with Indians from the age of fifteen until her death.

Mary Jemison was captured in 1758 by Shawnee Indians and adopted by two Seneca women who taught her their customs.

She married a Delaware warrior who was killed, then a Seneca warrior with whom she had six children.

In 1821 she settled on the Genesee River in New York and became known as "the old white woman of the Indians". A writer named James Seaver wrote a book titled "A Narrative of the Life of Mrs. Mary Jemison" in 1823 and the book is still in print.

Gale Martin-Hansgen gave her presentation in costume and displayed a table of artifacts. Gale's love of Ohio history and the native people dates to her childhood. As an adult, her interest in history and natural resources influences her activities. Martin-Hansgen operates a historical interpretation business, Gale's Tales, explaining and demonstrating in costume the lives of our pioneer and Native American forebears. She is vice president of the Ohio Prairie Association and is a board member of the Headwaters

Outdoor Education Center and the Olentangy Watershed Alliance. She formerly served as education specialist for the Morrow Soil and Water Conservation District and as a part time naturalist at the Mount Gilead State Park.

As our Ancestors each left their legacy*


*The trunk of the tree is our very core

Captain Johnstone of the 37th Buckeye Division

Our speaker for the March meeting was Bruce "Bo" Johnstone, curator of the Union County Historical Society Museum. He is also a World War II re-enactor, and he portrayed Captain Johnstone, who was with the 37th Buckeye Division of the Ohio National Guard. World War II re-enactors are the second most popular, second only to Civil War re-enactors. Bo Johnstone gave us a first person presentation of Captain Johnstone of the 37th Buckeye Division of the National Guard, and described in detail the movements and assignments during World War II, 60 years ago in 1945.

At this time the Buckeye Division had just captured Manila. The National Guard was activated in October 1940. At that time we had the smallest army, so the draft was activated and the National Guard was assembled. Training was held in Hattiesburg, Mississippi where they had to finish building the camp. Many soldiers from Union County served in this unit with General Robert S. Beightler as their leader. In September they trained under hurricane conditions with rain everyday. It was good training for duty in the South Pacific.

In 1942 they thought they were all going to Europe to fight, but were sent to guard islands in the Pacific from the Japanese. Men in this division served in and helped protect New Georgia, Bougainville and the Philippines where they helped capture the city of Manila. The medical staff did an excellent job keeping them from getting sick in the thick infested jungles. His unit used M1 carbines and they worked well in the jungles. The Browning automatic rifle was being used along with grenades.

He shared a framed picture of General Beightler wearing his boar's tooth while he was being made an honorary member of a tribe in Fiji. In the beginning of his service there were approximately 15,000 men, and after 1945 there were 2000. Units were split and replaced. Not many Japanese were captured, as they would not surrender.

Bo brought many military items from WWII era for display, and he answered many questions.

The Ohio Genealogy Society, Union County Chapter will hold its annual banquet Tuesday, May 17 at Der Dutchman Restaurant in Plain City. The dinner begins at 6pm with the program following at 7pm. The 2005 inductees in the Union County Pioneers will be recognized. Our guest speaker for the evening is Jana Sloan Broglin. The topic for her program is, "A Boy Named Sue", unusual names found in your genealogical research.

Jana is a native of northwest Ohio. She is a professional genealogist with over 25 years experience. She has spoken at local, regional, and national conferences. She is a lecturer and a freelance writer. Currently Jana is serving as Vice President of Membership for the Federation of Genealogical Societies and as a trustee of the Ohio Genealogical Society.
