UNION TOWNSHIP, UNION
 COUNTY, OHIO SCHOOLS.
 From History of Union Co., OH,
 Beers, 1883. Pages 183-184, Vol.

 This settlement (The Reed
 settlement) was made up on New
 England people, and they
 established the first free school in
 the township. As the settlements
 increase, these early schools were
 multiplied, until, in the spring of
 1826, the township was officially
 divided into school districts, as
 follows:

 Trustees of Union Township met
 for the purpose of dividing the
 township into school districts, and
 have divided the township into six

The schools were now thoroughly established with each and every district clearly defined. These districts have since been changed, perhaps several times, and their number increase until the township is

now divided into ten sub-school districts, as follows, with the enumeration of 1882:

Subdistrict No. 1, Males, 65; females, 49; total 114, white.

Subdistrict No. 2, Males, 31; females, 35; total, 66 white.

Subdistrict No. 3—Males, 17; females 14, total 31, white.

Subdistrict No. 4—Males, 12; females, 8; total, 20, white.

Subdistrict No. 5—Males, 7; females, 8; total, 15, white.

Subdistrict No. 6—Males, 10; females, 9; total, 19, white.

Subdistrict No. 7, Males, 10; females, 17; total, 27, white.

Subdistrict No. 8—Males, 35; females, 32; total, 67, white.

Subdistrict No. 9—Males, 31; females, 30; total 61, white.

Subdistrict No. 10—Males, 12; females, 22, white. Total males, 230; total females, 212; grand total, 442.

DISASTER LOOMS UNLESS YOU HELP

Computer viruses will fizzle if everyone follows five steps.

This might be your last warning.

There's a computer disaster coming. If you're not ready, it's going to hurt, bad.

And it could strike at any time: today, tomorrow, next week....

In fact, if "we're" not ready, it's going to hurt. Individuals who prepare themselves will still feel the pain if too many others ignore their responsibilities. In the Internet era, we're all in this together. Unprotected computers can become weapons for the bad guys.

The coming disaster won't lead to immediate deaths. It could, however, be even more damaging to the economy, and over time will mean bankruptcies, injuries and deaths.

Computer Viruses

What's this disaster? Simply: a computer virus with teeth.

You may have heard that 2003 has been the year of the computervirus, attacks that ever before.

(By the way: the terms "virus" and "worm" are so often confused these days that they've pretty much come to mean the same thing" an uninvited program that tries to spread copies of itself to as many computers as possible, typically using the Internet. A "Trojan Horse" is a virus or worm packed inside an innocent-looking program or document. In this story, and most others you read about computer threats, the term

"virus" can cover the whole range of attack programs.)

Well, there were a lot of viruses in 2003, and they annoyed plenty of people as they crowded e-mail inboxes and slowed Internet connections. Some viruses even penetrated personal privacy by scooping up and trying to send off personal details such as credit card numbers and passwords.

But none of these viruses dropped the big bomb. None erased the infected hard drive.

They could have. It's pretty easy for a program to erase big portions or all of the information on a hard drive. Even erasing targeted types of information—say accounting files—would mean something between migraine and ruin for individuals and businesses around the world.

Virus Epidemic

Why didn't they? Apparently because the virus makers were more interested in making a splash, showing off how many computers they could infect, than in doing real damage.

It's as if we suffered an epidemic of break-ins across the country and the only things missing were keys to other buildings.

It's as if arsonists lighted fires in millions of vulnerable spots and then just blew them out.

To prove they could do it.

That's not good. It's scary. But it isn't a disaster. Yet.

Imagine the real virus disaster.

It will be something the Y2K predictions, without the totally loony stuff such as planes falling from the sky.

What Could Happen

A new virus will spread quickly across the Internet, infecting millions of computers within ten

minutes. It might be helped by bits

left behind by previous viruses, timed weapons that turn unprotected computers into "zombies" that spew out more viruses all at once.

When a computer has been thoroughly ransacked for e-mail addresses that can carry the infection farther, the virus will issue its final command: erase and format the hard drive. All

information will be wiped out.

Individuals will lose their tax returns, personal photos and correspondence. (Which means heartache and big expense.)

Businesses will no longer know who their customers are, where they are, who has paid and who hasn't. (Which means some won't survive as businesses and will lead to big layoffs.)

Hospitals won't know who has been treated for what and is allergic to which medicine. (That's where the injuries and deaths come in.)

You and I will lose services from companies that disappear, lose jobs from companies that struggle, receive bills from companies we've

already paid, find store shelves empty (as transport firms have to rebuild their shipping systems from scratch) and ATMs closed (just this week we heard of the first infection of ATMs by a common virus—ATMs, by the way, that were running Windows software).

OK, enough with the arm waving and exclaiming.

Protection

What can we do?

Surprisingly, avoiding this disaster is easy, and nearly free. just takes a little time and attention.

The only cost will be to those who don't have a CD-RW drive, which every computer should have these

days.

Five Step Program

If you'll take these five steps, and urge your friends and colleagues to take them too, we can at least cushion the coming disaster, or even defuse it. The free programs mentioned below are generally only free for personal, home use. If you have a business, spend a few expendable dollars to buy the upgraded business versions.

1. Back up your data now. Take a break from whatever you're doing to make a safekeeping copy of your information: documents, photos, accounting, whatever.

You don't need special software to do this. All you really need is a

CD-RW drive and some blank (they cost about 40 cents each) CDs. Do it now. Then do it daily

if you're a business or weekly if

you only use your computer for personal stuff

2. Never ever open e-mail attachments until you've called the person who sent it and ask them what it is and why they've sent it.

3. Use your Internet connection

(Don't have one? Then don't worry about any of this after step

1.) to go to www.zonelabs.com

(click through the choices to find the free firewall for Windows.

Always have your firewall on while your computer is on. And when it asks if a program can get out to the Internet, generally answer "No" or "Yes, but just this time" unless you specifically know what the program is and why it wants the Net. If you don't know, call your Internet tech support people to ask.

What about Mac and Linux?

The coming disaster is a Windows problem, so you're already in

pretty good shape. It's also an Outlook and Internet Explorer disaster, so if you will move to the free OpenOffice and Mozilla programs, we'll also be safer.

4. Go to

www.grisoft.com/us/us_dwm;fr_ee/php to download and install a free anti-virus program for Windows.

5. Periodically - say, once a week - click on the little toolbar icons for the firewall and the anti-virus program and use the "update" feature to make sure you have the latest free versions.

All You Need

That's it. Just five steps: Backup, no attachments, firewall, anti-virus, keep up to date. If enough of us do this - instead of the approximately 30 percent who backup and even fewer who have firewalls - the disaster won't happen or will fizzle out. OGN

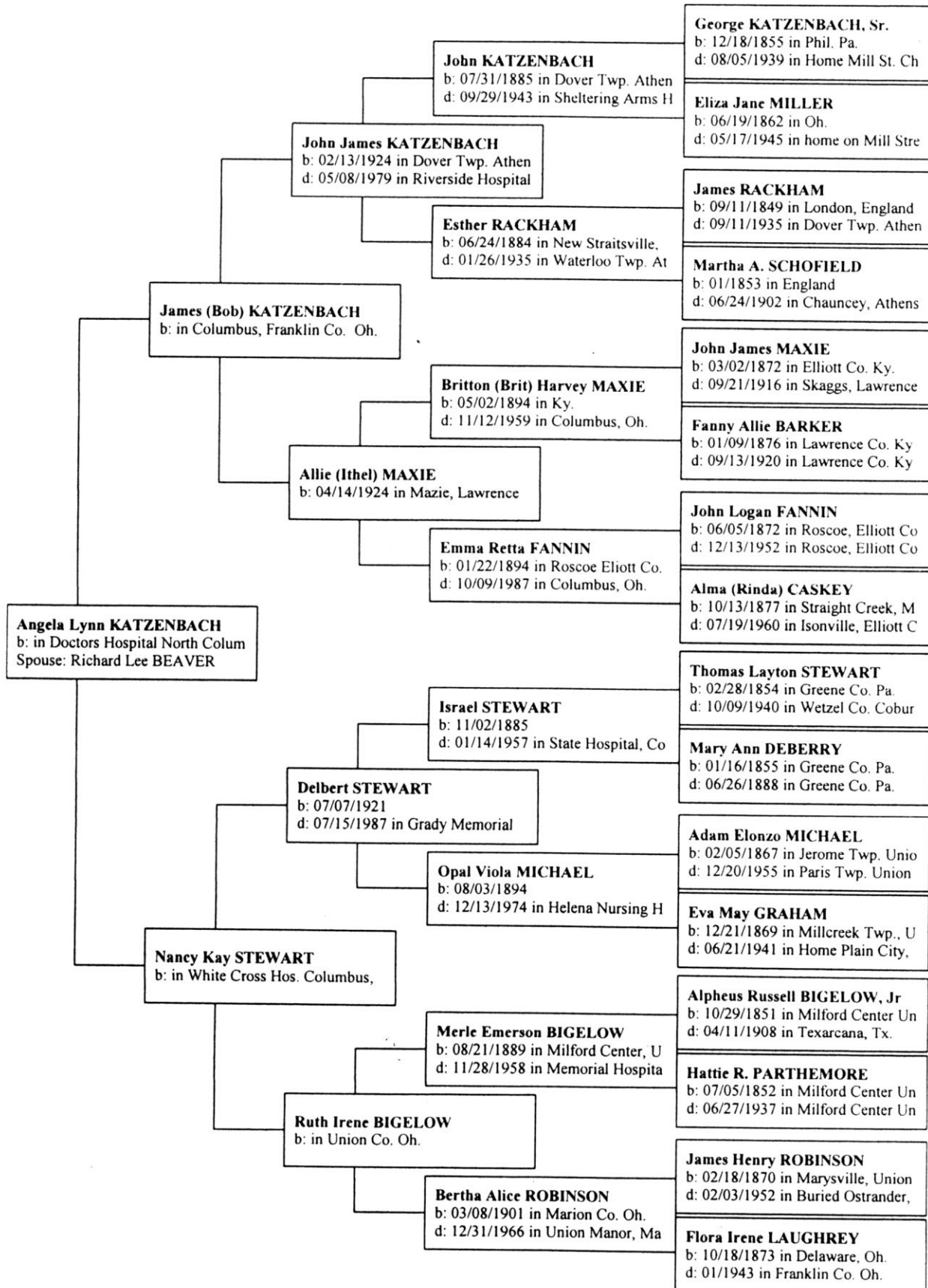
